



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

If there was ever a short line railroad worth modeling, it would have to the Kankakee, Beaverville & Southern. The railroad operates with vintage Alco diesels, except for two recently leased EMD's. It has an engine terminal that is easy to model in a small space.

There are no wye's or turntables to turn the engines. The yard trackage is not complicated or wide, and most of the customers are grain elevators, each totally different in size, design and style.

The day we stopped at the terminal, there were a couple of Alco units sitting outside of the engine house, and one had the paint peeling off of the front nose and you could see the original owner's (Norfolk & Western) logo. There are a couple different paint schemes among the different model series of the Alcos. If you politely ask, you may be allowed to walk around the engine terminal (outside of the building) and take pictures. They may even be willing to talk (and talk) about their





railroad if they're not too busy.

Just south of the main terminal yard is a bone yard with a couple of scavenged Alco units that have been used for parts for the operating units. You can't call a parts distributor and order Alco parts anymore, so they cannibalize what they can find.

There is an Alco resting on a cribbing of ties, the trucks removed, another is an example of what an engine looks like after it has rolled over, and still another as an empty shell.

There are some odd cars and an ex-Milwaukee coal tender fitted out with a large snowplow. What's unusual about the snow plow is that it faces north for plowing. What does the railroad do to plow south? A few miles north in the town of St. Anne sits another retired Alco engine outfitted with a large snow plow on the south end of the engine. The motor has been removed and the shell filled with concrete blocks. So, they must use an operating locomotive to go south to pick up the tender to plow north to get the southbound plow to go the other way. Unique.

In the town of Iroquois, we found an 80-ton General Electric center cab diesel locomotive that belonged to the



local grain elevator to shunt cars around. The locomotive was painted a medium dark blue and had no other markings at all—no company name or identity numbers, not even safety lettering.

If you have a free day or weekend, a visit to the Kankakee, Beaverville & Southern would be time well spent. You can find a starting point just outside of the city of Kankakee and follow the tracks south, eventually reaching Illinois Route 52, and then parallel the tracks south. Where else can you go to find operating Alco locomotives?

The Prototype Would Never Do That



If the accompanying bridge pictures were of a model on someone's layout, the modeler would be criticized not following the prototype—but, these *are* actual photographs of the prototype bridge!

While heading to the Hoosier Connection Convention, Grant Law and I were following the Kankakee, Beaverville, & Southern (KB&S) south from Kankakee, Illinois, and eventually along US 52. South of Donovan, Illinois, is Iroquois Junction—the main offices, yards, and engine terminal of the KB&S.

There, located just north of the engine terminal, is the grade separated crossing of the old Milwaukee Road "Southeastern" and the former New York Central "Big Four" line, now both owned by the KB&S.

The railroad operates a segment of the Big Four (NYC) extending from Lafayette, Indiana, to Kankakee, Illinois; a segment of the Milwaukee Road's Southeastern extending from Hooper, Illinois, to Danville; a segment of the Nickel Plate from Cheneyville, Illinois, to Templeton, Indiana; and two short segments of Conrail's (NYC) Danville Secondary

line to Free and Stewart, Indiana.

At Iroquois, Illinois, the Southeastern crosses over the Big Four and US 52 on this most unusual bridge. Although there was never a junction or interchange track at this location, the KB&S built an inclined interchange track from the Big Four up to the Southwestern in the southwestern quadrant to connect the parts of their railroad.

Evidently, the original structure was once a double-track bridge, but this has been reduced to single track. The concrete piers still indicate the double tracking and the steel portions of the structure shows the cutting marks of the reduction. Talking to a gentleman at the KB&S terminal, we were unable to gain any further information about the history and dates of the bridge's original construction or modifications.

There are a multitude of different bridge types all in this one structure. From the north, there are two sections of deck-plate girders crossing over Route 52, a wood-pile trestle, a through-plate girder, a steel-truss bridge (skewed), another through-plate girder, and another wood-pile trestle, to an embankment. The south embankment has been reduced in width from the double track to a single track width. The wood pile trestles are also based on a single-track design,

which would indicate that the wood portions were installed (or rebuilt) after the single tracking.

The bridge crosses Route 52 on an unusual concrete and steel span pier that has concrete piers on either side of the highway connected by a steel girder upon which the bridge rests. This span pier is also wide enough for two tracks.

The Milwaukee tracks was purposely elevated for this crossing and the embankments raise the tracks from the flat grade and return to grade. The south embankment remains above grade for quite a distance to the south. The interchange track rises from grade to meet the south embankment about 100 to 150 yards south of the end of the bridge. At the turnout there is still no evidence of the double tracking.

The KB&S, itself, is unusual in that they still feature Alco diesels (as of 2001), and until very recently that's all they used. They obtained the Alco's and used some of them for parts to keep others running. Just recently they leased two EMD units.

This is really an unusual bridge on an unusual railroad and it would be worth the trip to see and photograph it. Remember, what you see today may not be there tomorrow.



Another short section of timber-pile trestle is used on the south end of the hridge,



Although the embankment is only wide enough for a single track and that the wood-pile trestles are only one track wide, the concrete bridge supports are made wide enough for double track.



The wood-pile trestle sections are made with rather straight-forward construction. The bridge has a walkway with a wire guard fence.



Is the hot summer getting you down? Well, be careful what you wish for, because winter can really get you down—down the mountainside, that is.

One of the more interesting modules at Highwheeler 2001 was an avalanche scene in HO scale presented by Gerry Souter of the Arlington Heights Society of Model Engineers.

Gerry own five of the modules that make up the modular layout of the Arlington Heights group. Avalanche! depicts a disaster on the Red House & Angola Railroad set in the Allegheny Mountains. The wreck scene is nonoperating and the modules through



tracks, connecting it with other modules are below the snow scene.

Close inspection shows a "forced perspective"—Gerry used N scale figures higher on the slope to make the hills seem even taller.

Gerry described how he built the dramatic module in the December, 1999, issue of Railroad Model Craftsman.

The whole module is shown in this view. Note how the scene towers above the through tracks.



Ex-President's Report

I'd like you to meet Richard Cecil, your new Mid West Region President, Of course, a lot of you already know Dick. He's been active in Region activities for more

than a few years, but for those of you who don't attend MWR meets, here's a photo I took at this Spring's meet.

As your outgoing MWR president, I present my final report. It has been four years since I was allowed to lead the Mid West Region and set the direction to bring the MWR back from certain financial ruin. Our financial position at that time would, if we were lucky, have allowed us to operate for maybe six months at the most. The treasury was almost non-existent. Almost all of the Region Services were forced to reduce or cancel their programs in past years due to lack of funds to work with. The MWR was looked at as the example not to follow by the other Regions.

We reviewed the situation and recommended a direction to establish a Region Program as the most practical of any options presented. There was a general reluctance to accept dues but after the point was put to the membership vote, it was accepted, and passed. We had established a target of trying to retain at least 1,000 members as Region Members. The NMRA showed a total national membership of 2,600 living in the Region when we started dues. The Mid West Region currently has in excess of 1,600 Supporting Region Members.

Our current financial position has money in the bank, and the Region is stable. We are not rich, but have money to re-establish services to our members. The tight control of finances by our Treasurer, and restraint in spending by the Board of Directors has established a responsible program of monetary stability. A copy of the financial report can be found in this issue of the Waybill.

The Board of Directors has embarked on a program of updating and upgrading the MWR Constitution and Bylaws. Many of the provisions of the MWR Constitution need to be changed to incorporate current legal requirements. There are statements that can be construed to be out of line with the law. Some of the Bylaws require changes to allow the Board of Directors to properly manage the business of the Region with these new laws. Some of the reviewed items have created some interesting "discussions" at the Board of Directors meetings. Any and all of the changes in the MWR Constitution will be

submitted to the membership for approval and acceptance by vote before the changes can be adopted.

The MWR has made headway on application for our 501c3 application. Reviewing situations that other groups have gone through with their applications, our committee has checked specifically all of our documentation and the requirements of the IRS before we submit. We will ask to have a vote of approval by voting Region Members at our next annual meeting at the Spring Convention 2002. This is a requirement for the final petition of the 501c3 request.

The Waybill has improved, even though I still allow mistakes to sneak in when I'm not looking. The Region is still looking for someone capable to take charge of the Waybill. The improvement from photocopied issues to the current magazine is apparent. We have had the assistance of Greg Heier and Joy Forsberg, of 48/ft, O Scale News, to do the actual layout and preparation of the copy and pictures for printing, and arranging to have Rochelle Printing do the printing and mailing of the magazine has actually saved money. The issues of the Waybill cost us less than a dollar an issue. Since Rochelle Printing uses the glossy, polished paper for their other printing, it actually costs us less than using standard paper. It would cost too much to have them change the large paper rolls on the presses from the paper they normally use. We still need input from members about railroad and modeling related topics to include in the Waybill.

The Youth in Railroading Fund has been sitting, and gaining interest money, for four years. We need your ideas on ways to utilize the funding in ways to attract youth, both boys and girls, to look at model railroading as a possible hobby. Captain Al Nelson has agreed to chair a committee to outline a program of how the fund is to be used, how to add to the fund, and what kind of programs to develop. Any and all ideas submitted will be reviewed towards implementation.

As a final note, I would like to seriously thank everyone on the Board of Directors, both recently past and current, for all of their support, and faith, and specifically their assistance during the last four years. Together we have changed the direction of the Mid West Region, and brought it back to life. The Region was not managed by a single individual but a cohesive team dedicated to improving the quality of membership in the Region. We have started a positive program and the new Region management will continue that direction. My only request is that everyone support them as you have supported our team. As I stated in a previous editorial, getting involved will tremendously improve what you can get out of the NMRA.

At the Noblesville, Indiana, Twenty-oh-One Hoosier Connection, the results of the Mid West Region Spring Election were announced.

- Richard Cecil received 92 votes to Mike Hurlburt's 88 votes for the Region President.
- Gary Children received 129 votes to John Drozdak's 48 votes for Vice President.

You had been asked to vote for three of four candidates for Director at Large. Due to an unfortunate problem with her membership processing, Annette Hauser had dropped out of the NMRA. This, of course disqualified her from the election. The Northwest Hoosier Division 3 of the NCR will host this event in Fort Wayne. Indiana, on October 26 to 28, 2001. There are still some details yet to be worked out, but Mike Hurlburt is in direct contact with the convention staff and is getting more information so that we can have the Board of Directors to accept and approve this as an official MWR event.

At the MWR request, there will be an auction similar to what we normally have with our conventions. More information will be in the August Waybill.

Trustee Report by New Trustee Dave Liesse

Hello, all... I'm Dave Liesse, the new Trustee from the Mid West Region, and I'm here to help you. The Trustee has two basic responsibilities: set policy for the NMRA, and act as a liaison between the Mid West Region members and the national organization. In that regard, please feel free to contact me at any time.

We recently had a Board of Trustees meeting in St. Louis, Missouri, just before the NMRA National Convention. I won't go into details here, as I've sent them to all the Division newsletter editors, but I will mention the dues increase; we can't do enough to get the word out. Effective September 1st, Regular dues for the NMRA will increase to \$45.00 per year. The other categories of membership, which are all based on the regular rate, will go up correspondingly (new rates are \$90.00 Sustaining, \$30.00 Youth, \$23.00 Affiliate, and \$9.00 Family). For a further explanation read my column in your Division newsletter, get in touch with me, check Allen Pollock's column in the Bulletin or check the "News" section on the NMRA's web site www.nmra.org.

I'm sending separate columns to the Divisions and to the Region, so the majority of you don't have to read the same stuff twice. I realize, though, that some of you live in inactive divisions that don't publish newsletters. If you'd like to receive a copy of what I send to the divisions, just let me know and I'll be sure that you get one.

We're looking for three region-level representatives for national programs. If you'd be interested in filling any of these positions, let me know.

AP MANAGER John Mann has made known his desire to be relieved in this position, and I'm looking for a good worker to fill his shoes. Coutrary to popular misconceptiou, you do NOT need to be a Master Model Railroader to do this job. It's primarily administrative in nature, involving a lot of paperwork. At the same time, it can be very rewarding when you present mem-

bers with their award certificates. The full job description is too long to put into this column, so I'm submitting it separately for inclusion in this issue of the *Waybill*. If it turns out that there's not enough room for it, and you want to know more, please get in touch with me and I'll get you a copy of the job description.

EDUCATION COORDINATOR This is a new position being requested by Rich Coleman, the National Director of Education. The responsibilities of this job will be to coordinate information on all the educational activities taking place within the Region, keep Rich informed, and more or less act as a clearing house between Divisions. Aside from the obvious help this provides with the flow of information, it will also help to document the educational activities of the Association, activities which form the basis of our 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status. Having this information readily at hand certainly won't hurt the Mid West Region's application for this status, either.

Member Aid Coordinator Member Aid is a program that provides, on request, modeling information to NMRA members. The National Chair, Wil Seaver, needs a committee member from each Region to help with this program. Responsibilities include receiving requests for information and either answering them or passing them along to someone else who can. While it has been argued that this is the responsibility of every single inember, and that such help is readily available through the Divisions, the fact is that there are members who, by remoteness or schedule, can't regularly attend Division Meets and may not know any other members. There are also times when no one seems to know the answer. The Member Aid Coordinator serves as a single point of contact available to everyone.

Mid West Region NMRA Treasurer's Report, July 21, 2001

This is my final report as Mid West Region Treasurer, as Annette Hauser will be assuming this position after today's meeting. After six years, I think it's time to let someone else have a crack at it. It's been a good time, and I thank everyone for their support.

For six years, I have been asking for an annual audit of the books. We're finally going to have one; Dick Cecil has appointed Bob Sherman to conduct an audit. Unfortunately, our schedules haven't meshed to this point, and it's going to be mid- to late-August before we have a chance to get together. At least it is forthcoming.

The Mid West Region appears to be doing a good job holding the line on expenses, based on the Budget Report, but that is a false picture since we should have printed two Waybills so far this year. Other expense categories are close to budget, and where percentages may be out of whack it is either a matter of (a) timing, with monthly budgets prorated over the year while the expenses are one time, or (b) the numbers are so small that any deviation inflates the percentages.

On the income side, we aren't doing as well as hoped.

In particular, dues are running well behind projections. The shortfall is ameliorated by unbudgeted revenue in other areas, but it looks like we need to address the issue of region membership and the benefits to the members. I'll have more to say on this subject in the Trustee's Report.

Despite my efforts over the past month or so, I still have some trouble reconciling all the cash flow items in the records. Thus, I once again caution that the financial reports are subject to modification. I'll be keeping a copy of the financial records, since they're on my computer (Annette will get a disk of the databases), and until the audit I'll also keep most of the raw paperwork to help me address the discrepancies. I can assure you that all the bank balances are correct; it's just a matter of correcting the distribution of other assets and liabilities, along with income and expense. I'm confident that the next report will be as close to 100% accurate as is humanly possible.

The bottom line is that the Mid West Region is in good shape, financially, but we need to continue to monitor finances closely. We don't want to return to the point we were in three years ago!


ENGINEER AT THE THROTTLE

Convention attendees may also be instructed as engineers on the FWRHS's 44-ton Davenport diesel locomotive. Groups of three participants each will be scheduled each hour from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm on Saturday, and from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm on Sunday. After a short tutorial, each "engineer" will be given 15 minutes at the throttle under the supervision of an FWRHS engineer. The two "off-duty engineers" can ride for 30 minutes of the rotation. The cost is \$25.00, and the minimum age of participants will be 18.

NICKEL PLATE ROAD 765

The FWRHS is the proud owner of Nickel Plate Road steam locomotive 765. This famous locomotive is stored at the FWRHS 765 Locomotive Shop and Rolling Stock Museum. The 765 is currently being overhauled for its continuing career of passenger excursion service in a the 21st Century.

NKP 765 was built in 1944 by the Lima Locomotive Works in Lima, Ohio, just across the Indiana-Ohio border east of Fort Wayne. It was one of the Lima "super power" steam locomotives, that marked the very end of the steam era.

The 765 became well-known to Fort Wayne, making runs west to Chicago and east to Bellevue, Ohio. The Nickel Plate Railroad was famous for its high-speed, steam-powered freight trains in an era when the other railroads had already dieselized.

It served during the height of freight and passenger steam service in the Midwest. The locomotive was one of the last working steam locomotives on the Nickel Plate Railroad and was retired in 1958.

ABOUT THE FWRHS

The Fort Wayne Railroad Historical Society is an allvolunteer organization formed in 1972 to preserve and operate the Nickel Plate Railroad 765. By 1979, the Society's dedicated founders restored the 765 to operating condition and conducted the first of 240 movements including 142 railfan passenger excursions.

NPK 765, a Lima 2-8-4 Berkshire steam locomotive, is the centerpiece of the Fort Wayne Railroad Historical Society's (FWRHS) collection. The Society's charter is the operation of passenger railroad excursions which bring the thrills, sights and sounds of a large mainline steam locomotive of the past into the present. Its mission is to educate adults and children about an era when railroads and steam locomotives were the only means of long distance transportation in the United States.

The 765 is listed on the National Historic Register. Between 1979 and 1993, the locomotive operated in 16 eastern states from the Mississippi River to New York City and from the Great Lakes to the deep South, and along the

famous, scenic New River Gorge in West Virginia.

The locomotive has traveled approximately 52,000 miles while hauling up to 32 passenger cars. Over 100,000 passengers have enjoyed steam excursions behind this historic locomotive. Presently, 765 is located in the FWRHS Shop where it may be seen while repairs are performed on the boiler, drivers, running gear, and other parts.

Currently, the Fort Wayne Railroad Historical Society (FWRHS) is a recipient of a \$348,000 cost-sharing Federal Grant for historical preservation under the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21). This funding enables an overhaul of the 765 for future excursion operation. The local share of the cost of refurbishing this famous Fort Wayne steam locomotive is \$87,000. The public and local businesses have been invited to join FWRHS members in providing monetary contributions and in-kind volunteer labor or services to restore the 765.

Individual donations of any labor, service, business services, and monetary contributions are tax deductible and contribute toward the \$87,000 local share of the preservation grant.
