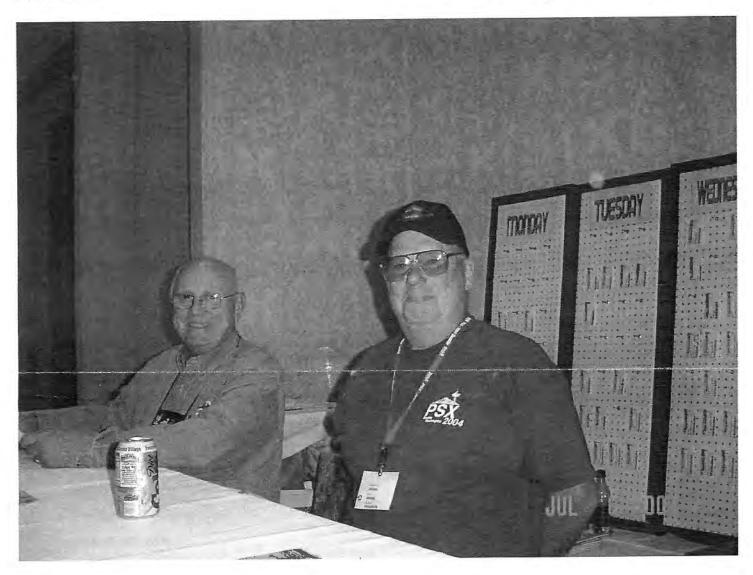

Speaking of conventions.....here's a few shots from the national convention.

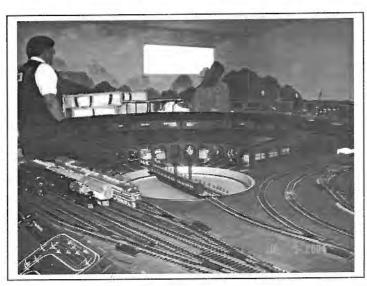

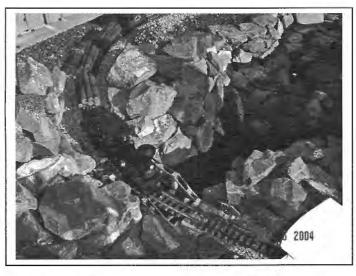

Some of us even had a chance to visit old railroad friends and take in a few rail clubs before venturing home.

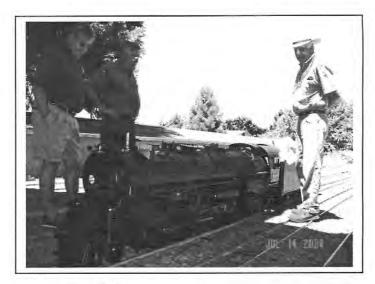
Here are a few photos of what we saw in the Grants Pass OR area.

# Remembering John Armstrong

During the 2000 NMRA convention in San Jose, I took John Armstrong to dinner after one of his clinics. I didn't intend to write about my visit with him, but Bob Wundrock, then editor of the SCWD *Bad Order*, suggested I do that after we had the pleasant surprise of sharing breakfast with John during the convention and sharing a table with him on Amtrak, from San Jose to Sacramento as we traveled home. Talk about rare mileage! The article appeared in the *Bad Order* in the fall of 2000. Credit Wundrock with suggesting I modify it for submission to *The Waybill*, after we heard of John's death, July 28.

John was 79 at the time. At times he looked it, at times he didn't. He had a great smile and low-key delivery to go with the olive in his extra dry humor. 1 attended both of his clinics. His first audience was much more responsive than his second, but he played both crowds well. In this age of videos and Power Point presentations, John's neat, handwritten, hand-illustrated overhead sheets were refreshingly simple. Besides, we were

listening carefully to his words. Let's hope the NMRA has recorded his clinics on videotape and will soon offer them to members.

He started with a sheet showing the different religions, as he called them, of The Railroad Hobby. At points of a triangle around those words were major groups--Railfans, Crafters, and Collectors. Around these he had every imaginable aspect of the hobby--historians, archaeologists, mileage collectors, tool collectors, live steamers, artists, contestants, brass-collectors, etc. He had a special category for Foaming Pennsy Freaks, for whom he had plenty of good-natured teasing.

There is almost always some truth in teasing, and later at dinner John elaborated with an example of Pennsy fans encountered over the years. Take headlight placement on steam locomotives, suggested John. Generally, headlights look best at the center of the smoke box, where most railroads placed them. But said John, "the fan of The Standard Railroad of the World states, 'If God had wanted headlights centered on smoke boxes, that's where the Pennsy would have them.""

John enjoys telling anecdotes and stories, yet apologizes sincerely, for talking too much. Of course he couldn't talk enough. Fortunately the gourmet restaurant in the hotel had delicious food and dreadfully slow service.

John's career as a naval munitions engineer ended with his retirement in the mid-70's, when he answered an ad in Railway Age magazine for a traveling reporter. He chuckled as he told how his editor at Railway Age, watched jealously from a desk in New Jersey, as John traveled for years visiting railroad

properties and interviewing executives throughout the nation, even traveling abroad, often with his wife.

These were the experiences that cemented John as one of the world's foremost authorities on railroads. As his reputation grew, the fact was not lost on railroad officials looking for information. It was a railroad executive who asked John to write a manual that would become his classic, The Railroad and How It Works. John retired from Railway Age several years ago. He was widowed in 1996 and lived in suburban Washington DC with one of his three sons, a librarian who kept him well fed; although, once a week, John said, he made himself a big pot roast. He has one daughter who resides near Sacramento.

John was born in Canandaigua, New York in 1921 and played with Ives tinplate trains as a child. At an early age, he noticed that real trains were different from the Ives and Lionel toys available at the time. John informed me that Lionel didn't make a model of a steam locomotive from 1923 to sometime in the 1930's, because manufacturers wanted to be modern, and electric locomotives were the modern locomotives of the time.

I asked John what is it about trains, about this hobby, that captures the attention of some and doesn't let go. I mentioned the strange aesthetic appreciation I have for a string of boxcars or hoppers that are identical save for the reporting marks and how that appreciation is heightened when the uniformity of the lineup is broken by one or two cars with slight variations in design. He reassured me with a smile that he had the same disease noting how, as a small boy, he observed that NYC sleeping

cars were a little different from PRR sleepers. It was as simple as that and got him wondering about and frequenting the rail facilities of his hometown.

In typical Armstrong fashion, he remembered a story he relishes, and he was off relating how as a youth he traveled with his mother in a coach on milk trains. Once during one of the frequent stops to set out a couple of empties and pick up a loaded car, John observed the conductor directing a glaringly inefficient switching move. He remarked about it to the station agent and asked why the man was doing it that way. The agent replied succinctly, "Because he's stupid."

By 1935 John had developed the now famous Canandaigua & Southern arrowhead herald; although, he didn't begin his O scale C&S until 1950. Unlike many modelers in the 40's and 50's, not only did he not convert to HO, but he continued operating the C&S with the original outside third rail. Though the noble thought didn't last, John's penchant for sticking with the outside third rail inspired me at the time to think that I might eschew DCC and hold my head high in 30 years with a cab/block system of standard Atlas components.

John recalled John Allen, 8 years his senior, and the ribbing Allen received from friends who, sticklers for the prototype, thought some of his scenery was excessive, like the famous view of up valley with four railroad bridges, one behind the other, receding into the distance. John relished the tale of how Allen satisfied the prototype hounds in Switzerland, during their roundabout rail excursion to the NMRA convention in London in 1971. The group was looking out a window together as

the train emerged from a tunnel to the panorama of a long valley with three or four bridges crossing the valley at various points into the distance. The stickler's gave Allen his due then and there.

One upping another modeler or looking down on one who does things differently from him or the norm was not something John did. He embraced the characters of his stories with love. He told of visiting one fellow in the 1950's who threw one switch and ran 21 trains automatically through various blocks in sidings and yards, from start to stop, all with mechanical relays. John enjoyed observing the many different ways people have fun model railroading. While he knew the need for standards of excellence, he kept things in a healthy perspective. In his clinics, he chuckled and said, "Well, after all, the point is that we're just trying to have a little fun with these trains." He said variations of that in our visits. John himself prized a gondola filled with staples, from audit reports passed along by a friend who worked for the IRS.

Sometimes just trying to have a little fun *is* the problem. John told of a physics professor at a prestigious eastern university who hid his identity for fear of not attaining tenure. The department chair expected faculty members to devote themselves wholly to their field, with no room for diversion whatsoever. Older readers of Model Railroader well remember articles by Eric La Nal, pseudonym of the aforementioned professor, Alan Lake Rice.

On the train from San Jose to Sacramento, sitting at the table in the club car, John pointed out a great location to model. Though we

didn't enter Niles Canyon, at its mouth we crossed the tracks that extend into it, where John remarked how the setting would make a beautiful spot on a layout--diamond, abandoned interlocking tower, river, and trees. He was right on with his eye for a modeling possibility.

As we passed a Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) terminal and ran parallel to its track, I prompted John with one question and proceeded to learn a great deal about the BART he toured as a reporter for Railway Age. I'd heard of BART's cost overruns, but I didn't know that BART is broad gauge--5'6". John said it had something to do with the speed at which some design engineers wanted the trains to take the curves. According to John, due to problems with fare machines that have a stateof-the-art mechanical system and Stone Age electrical components, BART switched manufacturers of fare machines halfway through constructing the system. Unfortunately, the new machines arrived with state-of-the-art electronics but Stone Age mechanicals. BART now has about half of each kind. Then there was the problem of the aluminum wheels and the perceived need for BART to have its own shops....

As we neared Sacramento, John reminisced about a trip he took on the Rio Grande Zephyr, the Denver-Salt Lake City tri-weekly passenger train that the D&RGW was required to operate in the '70's, after opting not to join Amtrak. Leaving Denver, the crew chief intoned over the intercom, "Ladies and Gentlemen, this is your crew chief, and I would like to welcome you aboard the Rio Grande Zephyr on behalf of the Denver and

Rio Grande Western Railway, your conductor, the train crew, and our engineer 'Mad Dog' Chandler." Later when the train stopped for a red block, perhaps near the entrance to Moffat Tunnel, the chief came on, "Well ladies and gentleman, I'm sure you have noticed that we have stopped. It seems that we've hit a moose and now Mad Dog and the fireman are trying to load it in one of the baggage cars. I am sure we'll be underway in just a few minutes."

We said goodbye to John Armstrong that bright Sunday morning after the 2000 convention at the Sacramento station. He went next door to the California Railroad Museum, where he said his daughter would pick him up after church. In a few days, he'd take the Coast Starlight to Seattle and the Empire Builder east. When we boarded the California Zephyr an hour later, we were not so secretly wishing that Mad Dog Chandler could be at the throttle, but even more so that John Armstrong could be across the table.
