



HIGHBALL TO INDY, 2016



It's less than a year to the next NMRA National Convention and National Train Show. Not only is it close in time, but it's also close in distance. Here's your chance to attend another convention that will be essentially in your backyard. July 3, 2016 marks the beginning of Highball to Indy, 2016 which will be held in downtown Indianapolis, IN. The Central Indiana Division will be the hosts and will be looking forward to your visit. We have been working hard to ensure you will have plenty of opportunities to add to your model railroad enjoyment and expertise.

Planned prototype tours will include visits to local railroad facilities. Tour Amtrak's Beech Grove Shops to see how Amtrak cars and engines are refurbished and/or repaired. Visit Indiana Rail Road's new loco maintenance facility at INRD's Hiawatha Yard. Check the Tours tab on the 2016 website for updated information about tours as they are announced. www.nmra2016.org

There are currently 20 layouts listed under the layout tour tab. Check out the photos of each layout to find the ones that interest you. We'll be adding more layouts to this area of the website. As with the prototype tours, check the website often for updated information.

The list of clinics and clinicians is increasing, too.

We expect it to increase dramatically after the Portland Convention. In time, the clinics will be listed on the site. We are also planning on having varied and extensive Non-Rail, and General Interest programs for those whose interests may not be primarily based on model railroading. Indianapolis is a great location for family attendance at conventions due to the number of interesting attractions within walking distance of the headquarters hotel. Tours will be available to visit museums, the zoo, and other locations a bit farther out from the hotel. If you wish to stay closer to the center of activity, there will also be presentations, hands-on workshops, and fun activities held in the convention hotel.

Two means of registration are currently available from the Highball to Indy, 2016 website's main page. You may either; print out a paper copy of the registration, complete it, and send it in, or, you may link to the NMRA site to register online. Choose whichever method is easier for you. Don't forget to get your registration in before the fares increase on Feb. 1, 2016. Now is a good time to get that done. If you are anything like me, you'll forget till after the fares increase. Do it now. Don't procrastinate. Save some money.

The convention hotel will be The Westin Indianapolis. Room reservations are not currently being accepted. Rooms will open after the first of the year, usually announced in the NMRA magazine January or February issue. We'll also make note of room availability on our website. The National Train Show (164,100 sq. ft.) will be held in the Indiana Convention Center which is directly across the street from the hotel. Access is available via covered, elevated walkway.

We look forward to your visit to Indianapolis next July, the 3rd through the 10th.

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
Around the Midwest Region by Walt Herrick, Fox Valley Division



A message from Mike Brestel, NMRA At Large Worldwide Director

The three strikes policy:

What is it and what does it mean?

We've been getting a lot of questions about the Visitor Policy that the NMRA Board adopted and publicized in February of this year, limiting visitors to NMRA meetings to three visits during their lifetime. This isn't really a new policy, since it was first adopted in 2007 and explained in the "President's Car" column in the November, 2007 issue of Scale Rails. Then, as now, the needs of our insurance provider played a large part in the adoption of this policy, but there are also issues of basic fairness, as well as tax issues in the U.S.

Here's the policy: Visitors are allowed three visits to an NMRA meeting IN THEIR LIFETIME. If they don't join by their third visit, they cannot attend any more meetings. A lot of the questions we've been getting are from members trying to over-complicate the policy, worrying about this or that exception and making up complicated what-ifs. The policy does not apply to spouses who come along to the meetings so that they can go to dinner afterwards. It does not apply to non-member caregivers who aren't modelers, but who provide a ride to a member who cannot drive himself. It does not apply to events that are organized for the general public, like mall shows, swap meets, beginner clinic series, and the like, nor does it apply to things like joint meetings with another group or family picnics or outings.

Allowing freeloaders to participate as if they were members is unfair because it takes advantage of our members who HAVE paid up. We're all paying to keep the organization going – what are the freeloaders doing, besides getting a free ride on our backs? And tolerating permanent freeloaders can give our insurance providers a reason to cancel your coverage if you have an incident, leaving individual officers and members responsible for paying the claim. The IRS has rules about giving benefits of membership to non-members, too – they say don't do it, and there are tax consequences if you do.

Now, if your Division and Region are already following the rules (which would be a really good idea if you want the protection of our NMRA Liability Insurance policy), this is not the big deal you might think it is. We all know that if someone comes and tries us out three times and still doesn't join, they're not going to join. So after the third turn-down, don't worry about it – just move on to the next prospect.

If you're still wondering whether your group is in compliance, just ask yourself: are you allowing people who aren't members to come to your meetings month after month, year after year, and participate as if they'd paid their dues? If the answer is no, then fine, just keep doing what you're doing. If the answer is yes, then you have some changes to make.

A few words from the President

A few words about LCC

You may have seen the ads or heard the scuttlebutt about "LCC". What is "LCC"? Well, in a nutshell it is "DCC for your layout," although it is much more than that.

DCC or Digital Command Control has been on the scene for almost 30 years now in one form or another. Originally introduced as an analog system commercially over 50 years ago by GE as "Astrak," this approach allowed individual control of locomotives through carrier waves superimposed on the rail system. It worked, but it had limitations such as heat buildup and the size and number of onboard receivers.

Today's far more sophisticated digital system uses digital packets of information sent through the rails along with the voltage needed to operate. Again, the emphasis is on individual control of motive power, and Astrak's limits have been addressed by this different system. But DCC also has limits, primarily when adding non-motive power devices to a limited bus line, such as stationary decoders for switch machines, signaling systems and detection. LCC is not intended to supplant or replace DCC for your motive power but offers many advantages in operating switches or turnouts, signaling, detection and even lighting. This column is not the place for a primer on LCC; we hope to offer that primer at Portland and in NMRA Magazine.

But understand, this new technology, built by hobbyists on a proven platform, is just that - NEW. That means that commercial products and the articles on LCC are still underway. As with any new technology, one predicts at their peril about its impact. We believe it holds great potential to do for your layout functionality what DCC has done for your motive power. It all depends upon the commercial sector and you, the consumer.

In theory, LCC offers a revolution in providing easier and less expensive control for your layout systems. Whether that theory is realized depends on you and your interest. I know that the timing is good for me as I embark upon a major layout project in the next few years. I want LCC along with DCC and hope it will be there when I am ready. For now, watch these pages as we finalize the standards and encourage the commercial sector to plunge into this new technology. For once, the NMRA is ahead of the curve and we hope no curve balls are thrown.

Those are my thoughts; what are yours?
